Welcome to the March 2012 volume of SEARCH: The South East Asia Research centre for Communication and Humanities. This peer reviewed Journal publishes original research in communication and the humanities.

This volume has four papers each of which discusses the media and the impacts that it has on society. In the first paper Thinavan Periyayya and Kumutham Krishnan explore the Moral Panic phenomenon caused by the media, focusing on African nationals in Malaysia. The second paper by Tan Chong Yew examines the frustrations suffered by Malaysian Chinese and the manner in which one particular iconic Malaysian expresses it through his *nom de plume* Namewee.

Review Policy

All contributions shall be subject to review by two experts in the field. The Board of Editors shall do its best to ensure a quick review process.

Frequency

Two issues per year: March and September
